

What's New at Atari Games?

WE ARE ON A HOT STREAK! For nearly two years now, Atari has had a series of hit games that is unparalleled in the history of the company (and probably the whole coin-operated games industry).

We have had one successful product after another. Right now we are in the enviable position of being back-ordered on all of our recent games. Rolling Thunder and Road Blasters are in such hot demand that we can't seem to produce enough of them. In addition, we have also recently released a small number of Championship Sprint kits and 720° games to fill firm orders that have been on the books for quite a while; we have been completely sold out of these games for several months but they are still in demand.

By the time you read this, we will have introduced our newest game, APB, at our annual distributor meeting which was held in Hilton Head, South Carolina on June 3-5. We are looking forward to a very positive response to APB from our distributors at this meeting. Considering that player reaction to the game has been very positive and it has performed very well on local field tests, we expect APB to be another in the recent line of hit Atari games. Because of outstanding orders on Road Blasters and Rolling Thunder, however, APB will not actually go into production until mid-July.

To give you an idea of what this new game is about, APB is a unique driving/shooting game where the player portrays Officer Bob in his action-packed pursuit of common law-breakers and hardened criminals. Several game play features are highlighted in APB:

(1) Multi-directional scrolling allows the player to drive in all directions on the screen, exploring the streets and back roads of Bob's beat; (2) Numerous detailed animation sequences are included to add humor and enhance player enjoyment as well as create player involvement with the many characters; and (3) a mystery APB offers long-term play appeal as the player collects hints in his quest to arrest the most wanted criminal.

In addition to the successful games designed by Atari, licensing deals such as those with Namco for Rolling Thunder and with Sega for Dunk Shot promise to help keep our factory busy and healthy in the future. Most

games offered to us for license do not meet our high standards of performance. If a game does not perform well on test in local arcades and street locations, then it is not manufactured by Atari Games. Although we have been offered many different games from several different companies, Rolling Thunder is the first game that Atari has licensed and manufactured since Pole Position II.

After extensive testing, Atari decided to license Rolling Thunder from Namco, Japan. We did not accept the game as is, however. As part of the terms of our contract, Namco agreed to make changes to the game play so that Rolling Thunder would be more acceptable to the players in the United States. Improvements were made to the operator options for game difficulty and standard Atari features such as add-a-coin game continuation and select-a-wave were added.

In the case of Dunk Shot, Sega was required to make several improvements before Atari would accept the game. Changes were made to the player start procedure, and special game continuation features were added to increase the competition between players. On Dunk Shot the winning player(s) can now continue the game for free while the losing player(s) must deposit coins to stay in the game. This add-a-coin continuation feature is similar to that designed into Atari's Super Sprint and Championship Sprint. Competition between players is intensified by this unique approach to game continuation.

Another first for Atari has also occurred recently as our expertise in industrial design and manufacturing has

been officially recognized by Capcom. Known in the industry for their excellent game kits, Capcom will be introducing their first dedicated upright game, Street Fighter, and has asked Atari to design a special game cabinet and manufacture the product for them. The major problem for Atari is to find a slot within our busy manufacturing schedule for Capcom's Street Fighter. At this time, it is planned to be on the production line in late July.

And what will Atari Games have to manufacture and market following APB? Well, there are several choices, all of which are still in the the relatively early stages of game play development and player evaluation. We will all just have to wait and see which of these internally designed games is ready first; but whatever the name of the game, you can be sure that it will be another winner to continue our hot streak!





John Klein




Sherry Liebster

Sr. P.C.B. Supervisor**


