HELPFUL HINTS FOR PLAYING MISSILE COMMAND

- 1** You may fire up to three defence missiles simultaneously. After pressing the controller (fire) button, move to the next enemy site and fire again. Do not wait for the explosion before moving.
- 2** Once a city is destroyed you no longer can defend it, so concentrate only on your missile base and saved cities. Ignore enemy fire aimed at cities already destroyed.
- 3** Smart enemy cruise missiles are easiest to destroy if your target control is directly on them. When it is directly on them, the enemy cannot detect your ABMs.

He was then whisked away to watch the England v. Rumania Match as a guest of BBC's Sportsnight. His interview with Jimmy Hill was screened on BBC TV that evening.

Thursday

On the following morning the Atari Owners Club took Pele to the Middlesex Hospital to meet children in the Bernhard Baron Ward. He was filmed by Thames Television and a five-minute feature was shown on Thames TV News that evening.

At lunchtime Ingersoll Electronics Managing Director Michael Marks hosted a press reception at the Roof Restaurant of the London Hilton - attended by over 100 journalists. That evening and the following day, Pele's smiling face appeared in nearly all the major evenings and nationals. During the afternoon Ingersoll Electronics held an autograph party at the Greens Electrical Department at Debenhams, Oxford Street. Burly police encircled the dias where Pele patiently signed away, holding back crowds of admirers of all ages.

Friday

On Friday morning Pele made another personal appearance - at Argos in New Oxford Street. This time the police were ready for his party and after a 2 hour signing marathon, he was off to Arsenal at Highbury, for a photocall. Here Pele was interviewed by the world's sporting press, and photographed with the Arsenal Team. He also met World Snooker Champion Steve Davies, and Ingersoll's U.K. Atari Owners Club Overall Champion, 11-year-old Stephen Bradley, and the Junior Champion, Stuart Clarke. Also present were many other soccer personalities, including veteran Jack Kelsey and Bobby Charlton. Pele was interviewed by BBC radio, BBC Brazil, etc - then he was off again in the chauffeur-driven Mercedes Ingersoll had provided - to do a feature for TV Times, with Bobby Moore.

Saturday

An exclusive interview with the Sunday Mirror was followed by another with Capital Radio - who insisted in recording Pele to a background sound of Space Invaders bleeps and Pele's Championship Soccer sound effects on the Atari VCS in Pele's suite at the Carlton Tower. Next, Pele was driven to Arsenal Stadium again to lunch with a party of Ingersoll Electronics customers - then he watched the Arsenal v. Aston Villa match which was sponsored by Ingersoll. This resulted in a 2 - 0 victory for The Gunners, much to everyone's relief! As the game started, the Owners Club had arranged to let off 1,000 "Ingersoll Atari" gasfilled balloons; and Pele did a lap of honour before the 57,000+ crowd, amid tumultuous applause.

Sunday

On Sunday evening Michael Marks and Steve Bernard were hosts to a gathering of a hundred or so guests at a Welcome Pele Dinner at the White Elephant on the River Club on London's Embankment. Highlight of the evening was the appearance of a magnificent chocolate cake laid out as a football pitch with tiny players, and even a ball in goal!
